PRICES PAID TO GROWERS

GEORGIA (via: Forest Park-Atlanta GA)

Weather conditions for the next few days throughout Georgia call for evening lows in the high 30s to low 40s and daytime highs in the low 60s to low 70s with rain expected in most areas on Sunday and Monday, December 4-5.

Demand is good for both the export and domestic retail gift-pack business, while domestic Shellers are increasing their purchases. Prices are higher. Offerings were light to moderate at the delivery buying points. Most of the lots were comprised of Blends with a few Cape Fear, Desirables, Schley and Stuarts.

Small lots of Blends (including export quality) with 42-54% meat yield (nut count 59-79) sold in a range of about \$4.60-5.48 mostly \$4.80-5.00 per point. Large lots of Stuart and Schley Blends with 49-56% meat yield (nut count 53-70) sold in a range of about \$4.80-5.12 mostly \$4.90-5.00 per point. Small lots of Stuart Blends with 45-55% meat yield (nut count 65-80) sold in a range of about \$4.60-4.90 mostly \$4.70-4.80 per point. Very few lots of export quality Desirable blends sold as high as \$6.17 per point but were too few to establish a market.

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OKLAHOMA (via: Oklahoma Department of Agriculture Market News Service)

Deliveries by growers to buying points light to moderate with most activity noted in northern counties this week. Movement of small lots of hand-picked pecans very light but movement of machine harvested natives increased in some areas. Buyers cautious toward quality and condition as there is a good deal of variation across the state. Harvest activity is progressing smoothly for most growers and this year's crop may be in storage earlier than usual.

The weather forecast this week calling for highs in the high 50s to mid-50s, lows in low 20s to mid-30s.

Prices are higher for all offerings with the bulk of sales noted on Natives with just a few sales of Improved Varieties confirmed. Demand was good for the limited offerings. Retail and gift box demand is good. Stuart Blends with 47% or better meat yield sold in a wide range of about \$5.32-6.38 per point mostly \$5.40-5.70 per point.

Prices paid to growers (as of noon Tuesday, November 17, 2016 to noon Thursday, December 1, 2016) at buyers delivery points or F.O.B. the orchard including direct sales to end users, cents per pound, in-shell of generally good quality in lots of 20,000 pounds or less unless otherwise stated.

Natives/Seedlings (deliveries very light to moderate) few sales machine harvested lots 170-195, yard tree lots 35-42% meat yield 75-100.
