PRICES PAID TO GROWERS

GEORGIA (via: Phoenix, Arizona)

The weather forecast for the next week in South Georgia calls for low temperatures in the low 40s to low 60s, highs in the mid-60s to low 80s, and a 10-50% chance of precipitation on Sunday, December 13 and Monday, December 14.

The weather forecast for the next week in Central and North Georgia calls for low temperatures in the upper 30s to upper 50s, highs in the low 60s to low 80s, and a 20-40% chance of precipitation on Friday, December 11; and a 20-70% chance of precipitation on Sunday, December 13 and Monday, December 14.

Buying interest is active for export quality pecans and for good quality pecans. For the wholesale and gift pack trade demand is strong as the holiday season approaches. There is a wide range in quality of pecans, as a result of wet weather conditions and continuing warm weather. Rot and smaller nut size have been reported.

Blends in both small and large lots of generally good quality with meat yields of 45-46% sold for about 4.00-4.05 per point. Schley Blends of gift pack quality with at least 50% meat yields sold for about \$4.00-4.15 per point. (To get price per pound use this formula: dollars per point times meat yield = cents per pound; to get per point figure: dollars per pound divided by meat yield = dollars per point).

December 8, 2015) at buyers delivery point or F.O.B. the orchard including direct sales to end users, cents per pound in-shell of generally good quality pecans in lots of 20,000 pounds or less unless otherwise stated.

LOUISIANA (via: Phoenix, Arizona)

The weather forecast for the next week calls for low temperatures ranging from the low 40s to mid-60s, and high temperatures ranging from the low 60s to low 80s. There is a 20-80% chance of precipitation from Friday, December 11 through Sunday, December 13.

Deliveries for Improved varieties have been very light with most of the crop sold as retail. Buying interest is good for in-shell gift pack, retail use and for commercial sheller use, however the lack of volume has shellers purchasing from other production areas until more pecans become available. A wide range in quality, including sprouting and embryo rot, has been reported.

WESTERN REGION - ARIZONA, NEW MEXICO AND WEST TEXAS (via: Phoenix, Arizona)

The Western Region pecan season has begun with light volumes, and the first Western Region pecan report of the season is expected to be released on Thursday, December 10, 2015.

TEXAS (via Phoenix, Arizona)

Deliveries by growers to delivery points of Improved varieties were very light. Demand was fairly good for good quality pecans. Cheyenne, Wichita, Pawnee and Choctaw are currently being harvested, as well as Natives. Harvesting is expected to remain about steady during the upcoming week.

The weather forecast for the next week calls for low temperatures ranging from the upper 30s to upper 60s, and highs from the low 60s to low 80s. There is a chance of precipitation most days during the upcoming week, with the greatest chance being on Saturday, December 12 and Sunday, December 13, where there is as high as an 80% chance of precipitation in some areas.

Buying interest displayed by end users was fairly good for inshell, gift

pack use, and moderate for commercial sheller use as shellers utilize inventories on hand or make purchases from other production areas or wait for additional availability of nuts. Trading was moderate for in-shell and gift pack uses.
