PRICES PAID TO GROWERS

GEORGIA (via: Forest Park-Atlanta GA)

Weather conditions for the next couple of days call for mostly mild temperatures with a 10-20 percent chance of rain. Evening lows in the low 60s and daytime highs in the low 80s.

Buyers are in the process of putting together lots to be shipped to Asia before November 15 for the New Year celebrations. Most of the large lots are being bought and sold for export deliveries and many are under contract sales.

Many of the growers in the southern areas of the state have been hit hard by the two previous storms that passed through. About thirty percent of the crop so far has been blown out during the cleaning process due to lack of development and scab. Many of the pecans had the stems break or crack and the pecans did not fully develop. For the pecans hitting the market, quality has been reported as good. Prices remain strong and demand is good. Domestic shellers and end users are sampling the pecan lots making bids and are competing with the retail and candy store operations at this time. Large pecans of high quality and appearance are destined for those markets, creating a rise in prices paid this week for all pecans.

Lots of Stuart Blends with meat yields of 45-48% (55-62 nut count or larger) brought in about \$5.21-5.57 per point. Lots with meat yields of around 48-54% (65-75 nut count) brought in about \$4.80-5.13 per point. Moneymaker Blends with 47% meat yield or better (70-80 nut count) brought in around \$4.32-4.33 per point.

Prices paid to growers (late afternoon Tuesday, October 25 through late afternoon Tuesday, November 1, 2016) at buyers delivery point or F.O.B. the orchard including direct sales to end users, cents per
