### PRICES PAID TO GROWERS

GEORGIA (via: Forest Park, Georgia) Atlanta

Temperatures ranged from evening lows of 36-51 degrees and daytime highs ranging from 47-71 degrees. Rain and cold weather have kept most of the growers out of the orchards the last couple of days. Prices are lower. Some growers have opted to hold the pecans in storage and sell them at a later date, hoping for prices to rebound stronger after the Thanksgiving holiday. Growers are about 70-90 percent finished with harvest, with the remaining going over the orchards for a final time by the end of the month.

Lots with generally good quality Blends with nut counts of 60-85 per unit and meat yields of 44-52% sold in a range of about \$3.00-3.40 per point. Light offerings of export quality Blends with nut counts under 60 per unit and meat yields of 50-56% sold in a range of about \$3.41-3.56 per point. There were very few lots of Cape Fear, Desirables and Sumner offered.

Buying interest and trading by end users is moderate for export business, shellers and accumulators, while fairly active for gift pack retail business this week. Some end users are utilizing inventories on hand, or purchasing from other areas.

## PRICES PAID TO GROWERS continued LOUISIANA - Via: Forest Park, Georgia (Atlanta)

(LA report will be issued once weekly-usually on Tuesdays)

Deliveries for Improved varieties were very light. Growers that are harvesting are waiting to get enough poundage together to get the best market price. Most of the movement is from retail sales and gift pack business. The volume of this season's crop is expected to be very low as compared to recent years. Rain has kept most of the growers out of the orchards this week.

Prices paid to growers (late afternoon Tuesday, November 18, 2013 through late afternoon Tuesday, November 26, 2013) at buyers delivery point or F.O.B. the orchard including direct sales to end users, cents per pound in-shell of generally good quality in lots of 20,000 pounds mostly 5,000 or less unless otherwise stated.

Desirable (deliveries very light) export quality 50% meat yield or better 200-240

Natives/Seedlings (deliveries light) yard tree lots 60-80 mostly 60-70 depending on size, quality and volume

Oconee (deliveries very light) 52% meat yield 180 occasional higher

Stuart (deliveries very light) 46% meat yield or better 170-230 mostly 170-200

**TEXAS** (Central, South, Eastern Areas) (via: Phoenix, Arizona)

Deliveries by growers to delivery points of Improved varieties were fairly light. Demand was fairly good for good quality pecans. Cheyenne, Choctaw, Desirable, Pawnee, Wichita, and Natives are currently being harvested.

Crops are of a generally good quality. The volume of pecans remains fairly small but is expected to increase up through the first week in December.

The weather forecast for the balance of the week calls for low temperatures in the upper 20s to low 60s, with highs in the mid-40s to mid-70s. A 10-30% chance of precipitation is projected for Tuesday, November 26, Saturday, November 30 and Sunday, December 1.

Prices for pecans are about steady. Buying interest displayed by end users was fairly good for in-shell gift pack use, and moderate for commercial sheller use as shellers continue to utilize inventories on hand or make purchases from other production areas or wait for additional availability of nuts. Trading was moderate for in-shell and gift pack uses.

Prices paid to growers at Texas delivery points or F.O.B. the orchard from noon Thursday, November 21, 2013 to noon Tuesday, November 26, 2013 cents per pound in-shell of generally good quality in lots of 20,000 pounds or less unless otherwise stated.
